
Class Corner - 6H

Annie Egan Memorial

Annie Egan was a World War 1 nurse from Gunnedah and a former Gunnedah Public School student.

She was working at the hospital in Manly when she contracted the Spanish Flu from soldiers returning from The Front. Annie passed away three days later.

Allan Miles (pictured) works for an organisation that researches and pays tribute to unsung heroes, such as Annie Egan.

Allan contacted the school last year and asked if a student would like to be involved in the memorial service to unveil a plaque dedicated to Annie. This unveiling occurred on the weekend and our school captain Sarah McInerney recited the iconic Dorothea MacKellar poem, My Country, as part of the ceremony.

Sarah did a fine job of representing Gunnedah Public School, not just once, but twice, over the weekend at two separate memorials.

The school would like to thank Sarah and her parents for agreeing to be part of this important event.

In addition to organising the weekend's memorial services, Allan also agreed to come in and talk to our Year 6 class. Year 6 has been researching to create their own biographies on a person of their choosing. Allan was able to talk about how and why he and his organisation do what they do when preparing to memorialise a person.

A big thanks to Allan for taking the time from his busy schedule to share his own story with our students.

We are learning to identify reasonable reactions when we are feeling happy, sad, angry or frustrated.














Dear Parents/Carers.

School Zones

Below is an email from Gunnedah Shire Council in regards to all the signage around the schools and town itself. Please read this carefully as council and police are cracking down on anyone not obeying the signage. In addition to this, you will be booked if you are sitting at the entrance to the cul-de-sac. This is not only illegal, but is so very dangerous with the amount of traffic now on Bloomfield Street. Staff will only let your children out the sandpit gate when your car is round to the driveway, so please keep moving around and remember that infants are let out at 2:50pm and primary do not leave until 3pm. Please time your pick up appropriately to reduce congestion.

If you are running late/picking up early DO NOT park outside the office on Bloomfield street before 9:30am or after 2:30pm or you will be booked.

Dear Principals and Teaching Faculties,

Approaching the end of the school year and with the resuming of "normal" school hours and activities post Covid-19 measures, it is timely to remind staff and parents/carers of their obligations to park safely and legally around schools. Council has noted an increase in illegal parking behaviours before and after school. Penalties do apply for parking offences and some carry demerit point deductions. Some parking offences in a school zone carry a \$464 penalty and 2 demerit points.

Through your social media and newsletters, it would be appreciated if you could encourage parents and carers to obey the signposted parking regulations around your school, and remind them that Council and Police do conduct parking patrols and will issue penalty notices for any parking offence detected.



Dear Parents/Carers

On 24 October 2021, the Treasurer and Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning, the Hon. Sarah Mitchell MLC, that school banking programs will no longer be run in New South Wales schools from 2022.

School banking programs at GPS are arranged at a local level via the schools' P&C Association. With the upcoming cessation of the program, students will no longer be able to deposit savings through the school banking program at GPS. You can still keep your child's bank account open and can continue to make deposits into your child's accounts through online transfer or at any bank branch. The decision was made following the review of the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) review on School Banking on 15 December 2020, which found that the costs of the program outweighed the benefits.

Key findings of the review include:

- School banking programs claim to help children develop long term saving habits; however, providers were unable to demonstrate that these programs in and of themselves improve savings behaviour;
- Payments to schools for implementing school banking programs incentivise schools to encourage greater participation in the programs;
- Young children are vulnerable consumers and are exposed to sophisticated advertising and marketing tactics by school banking program providers;
- School banking program providers fail to effectively disclose that a strategic objective of these programs is customer acquisition.

Financial literacy is embedded in the curriculum K-10. It is part of a continuum of learning in the *work* and enterprise learning across the curriculum content area from K-12. In Mathematics K-10, students develop knowledge, understanding and skills specifically related to financial literacy, such as money, financial transactions, pay rates, taxable income, rebates and levies. In Stages 4 and 5 many students elect to study commerce. A key objective of the Years 7–10 commerce syllabus is for students to develop skills in decision-making and problem-solving in relation to consumer and financial issues they may encounter now and in the future. Opportunities also exist for the inclusion of financial literacy in the mandatory Life Ready course in Stage 6. More information on the NSW Curriculum is available.

To further support our students with financial literacy education, the department launched the <u>Treasurer's Financial Literacy Challenge</u> in collaboration with ASIC. The challenge is currently in pilot intended for students in Years 5 to 8 but open to all. The challenge aims to engage students in practical activities focused on making informed financial choices, setting goals and managing money.
